Approximately sometime around 1:30 AM Sunday, October 17, 2010, I James Lynch, along with about 150 other students from Pace University were forced to exit Finnegan's Grill due to a scuffle among a few individuals. At this time I saw a car believed to be a Nissan Altima exit the parking lot and come around the bend in front of Finnegan's Grill. The car was not parked in a Fire Lane as police and media have been reporting, however he was going a little fast. As the car came out of the parking lot it made a left and proceeded on the road in front of Finnegan's Grill. Due to the angle of the turn one could

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easily conclude that the driver did not see the police officers and their cars parked in front of the bar. As the driver came around the bend at an unsafe speed police officers attempted to jump out and yell at him to slow down and pull over as he was still driving. One of the officers attempted to bang on his window. At this point another officer jumped in front of the moving car with his pistol drawn in one hand and his other hand in the raised position demanding that the car stop. I believe that the driver did not have time to stop and that the police officers who ran up to his car upon his turn startled him and caused the driver to panic. At this point the officer with the pistol drawn had a choice to either get out of the way or take action because there was no way the car could safely slow down in time. Sadly, I witnessed with my eyes and ears the police officer fire 3-4 bullets into the drivers side windshield. The driver lost control of the vehicle and struck the officer who shot him. The officer then ended up on the hood of the car. At this point the vehicle and driver had lost total control, it is possible that while on the hood of the car the officer still proceeded to fire again into the windshield at such a close range that death was almost certain. With the officer still on the car and the driver being shot at multiple times the car veered to the left of the road where I believe 2 or 3 cop cars were parked, striking into them. At this point I ran over to the accident fearing it was my brother or a friend of mine. I then saw my friend Dez Hindz who was a passenger in the car on the ground in hand cuffs. The police had a gun pointed at the back of his head as well which is unjustified because the individual was already detained with handcuffs behind his back laying on the ground chest down. I believe this situation was handled totally wrong and that the use of deadly force was totally inappropriate. Does speeding in a parking lot justify the death of a college student athlete? Whoever reads this I beg you to conduct a thorough investigation and get to the bottom of this. DJ Henry's family and friends deserve an explanation as to why their loved ones life was taken away on the night of Pace's Homecoming. There was no drugs, alcohol, or weapons involved with this car so how is taking this young mans life justified?

I know DJ Henry throught my brother Peter Lynch who was his teammate on the football team at Iona College.
